#### From the Administrator's Desk: Mr. David Murray

I've always enjoyed poetry – from Shel Silverstein to George Herbert, Dr. Seuss to the many authors of the book of Psalms, which is why I get very excited during the months of February and March when the Literature 8 class really dives into the art of balladry and verse. Every time I sit with the students to explore the nuances of poetic composition, I end up learning more, find myself contemplating simple to grandiose truths, and ultimately being encouraged, alongside the students, by the message of the authors.

One of the many beautiful aspects of poetry is that it often prompts us to chew on abstract themes, so that we have to slow down and contemplate the message as it relates to ourselves and to the truth of the Word.

The pragmatic side of my personality struggles with slowing down, but poetry almost always helps me notice and think about time, life, and purpose in a way that I hadn't before. Most recently, our class was discussing E.E. Cumming's "since feeling is first" (meant to be all lower case) and its implications. The students led the discussion and brought up the balance of living in the moment vs. contemplating one's actions to the detriment of missing the here and now. The conversation led us to the book of Ecclesiastes, what is done under the sun, folly and wisdom, and living with an eternal aim while enjoying the wonders of daily life.

I am encouraged by moments like these, as I hope all of the Trinity Academy families find time to ponder and wonder. I am encouraged by our students' minds, our co-teachers' and teachers' determination, and I continue to pray (and hope that you join me) alongside the psalmist, "Teach me to number my days, that I may get a heart of wisdom." (Psalm 90:12)

### Concentrated Studies, March 14-24

The focus of our two-week Concentrated Studies this year was an intensive study of the Renaissance. Students acquired an in-depth education into the history, culture, trades, and people during this time period.

In conjunction with regular studies, during these two weeks, activities and speakers helped build an integrated understanding of the Renaissance, culminating with the Wax Museum (grades 3-6) and a presentation of "Oliver Twist" (grades 7-11) on the 24<sup>th</sup>.

As music from the Renaissance played in the background, parents and especially grandparents (since March 24 was also Grandparents' Day), walked about the gym listening to students dressed in period costumes telling about the roles they portrayed. We were pleased to meet William Shakespeare, Martin Luther, other reformers, artists, kings and queens and other less well-known personages who lived during this time period.



This year's featured play, put on by students in the Logic

and Rhetoric schools, was an abridged "Oliver Twist." Students created the panoramic sets and moved easily between them as they enacted the highlights of the life of Oliver: raised until the age of 12 in an orphanage; discovered by Fagin and his gang of thieves; rescued by the Brownlow family; and finally adopted. The action was fast-paced and the actors moved seamlessly from scene to scene. Dramatic roles were played well, with some realistic pathos displayed by Fagin's girlfriend before her death. The play encapsulated Dicken's ragsto-riches, orphan-to-son story. It was a pleasure to watch.



And proving that we're never too young for Shakespeare, TA's secondgrade class, led by Mrs. Dixon, presented an abridged Romeo and Juliet. Though reluctant to dance (they are in second-grade, after all), and needing a lot of stage direction, Romeo and Juliet pledged their love and the entire cast had fun as they laughed at each other's foibles.
