From the Administrator's Desk: Mr David Murray

Joshua 1:9 says, "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

After the death of Moses and days before marching into the Promised Land, God gave this command and promise to Joshua. He was told not to fear, not be dismayed, but to be strong and courageous. These were mandates for the newly advanced commander of the Jewish people. Apprehension and timidity were not options for the one leading the charge.

And yet, there was assurance provided from the true and chief King, "the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Though Joshua had proved faithful and had put his trust in God, these words were given to him and to us as a declaration of God's trustworthiness.

This passage is a reminder that trust in God's consistency and faithfulness is vital to true courage. Joshua knew this truth and was used mightily for God's Kingdom. Neither Joshua's individual strength nor ours accounts for much when the battle-lines are drawn. However, strength in faith, true strength in the Lord (Ephesians 6:10), shakes the foundations of the world.

This promise is still available to all Christians. Here are a couple other Bible verses that uphold this truth:

- Isaiah 41:10, "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my righteous right hand."
- 2 Timothy 1:7, "for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and self-control."
- Matthew 28:20 [b], "... And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

May we serve with courage so that we might display His great glory. "Whoever speaks, as one who speaks oracles of God; whoever serves, as one who serves by the strength that God supplies—in order that in everything, God may be glorified through Jesus Christ. To him belong glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen." (1 Peter 4:11)

Beginning of School / New this Year

Bible Theme

This year our Trinity Family is studying the Old Testament heroes of the faith. As we walk the life the Lord has purchased for us, we are observing the valiant lives of those who have gone before us by examining their examples of faith. Although each OT hero was outstanding in faith, courage and steadfastness, we are honing in on one specific trait that characterized each one of them. For example, in September, we learned about Joshua's courage, while Ruth's loyalty has been our focus in October. Throughout the school year, we will devote a month to David's thankfulness, Isaiah's trust, Gideon's valor, Esther's compassion, Nehemiah's perseverance, Elijah's passion and Joseph's faithfulness. Our hope is that all of us will better learn to emulate these virtues in our own walk with the Lord.



Math and Reading Assessments

Within the first couple weeks of school, we assessed all of our students' math abilities in order to make recommendations for math placement and better serve the students. Additionally, Mrs. Caldwell with some of the Grammar School's homeroom teachers, assessed the lower Grammar School's students' reading levels. The results were telling and the data helps us to better serve these students and their families. Overall, the large majority of our students are at or above grade level in math and reading.

HELD program

We have hired Abbie Heitz, certified in Special Education, to work with students who will benefit from HELD services (Helping Educate those with Learning Disabilities). The HELD program will provide students who have learning difficulties with individual education plans and specialized instruction. We have thought and prayed about providing these services for a while and we are pleased to see this program put in place at long last.

Classroom Beautification

Our teachers have dedicated a lot of time and energy to decorate and beautify their classroom in preparation for this school year. We've painted walls and ceilings, hung pictures, arranged furniture, and laid rugs, in order to furnish cozy sitting areas in parts of our classrooms. The school looks so much more inviting and, in some rooms, more classical.

Co-Teacher Fellowship

In order to provide additional ways of communication between classroom teachers and co-teaching parents, we have begun to implement co-teacher fellowships this fall. This is a venue in which parents meet with the Homeroom Teachers (K-12th Grades) to fellowship, to encourage, and to share concerns over coffee and doughnuts. These fellowship sessions are loosely structured, begun with prayer, in which teachers share what is going on in their current classrooms, with co-teachers and parents encouraged to share positive feedback, ask questions, and voice concerns that might otherwise go unspoken. Our first get-togethers were in September and will continue throughout the school year.

Trinity Academy Gumdo Eagles

Interested students in 6th grade and above attended the first ever class of Koryo Gumdo, taught by Mr. Adams. Koryo Gumdo is a Korean sword skills class that literally means "The Way of the Sword." The September 12th exhibition covered the basics of sword fighting and weapons safety. The goal of this event was to gauge student interest in forming an after-school sword fighting class. There was enough interest to begin this club which will meet regularly when school is in session.

Chess Club

Trinity Academy's Chess Club is off to a great start. The club meets every Thursday after dismissal from 3:30 to 5:00 p.m. Students, teachers, and their families are offered a chance to learn and play chess. We know this club will help to foster creativity and problem-solving skills, as well as nurture relationships.

Logic and Rhetoric School Retreat, September 16th and 17th This year's retreat was completely different from previous years' retreats. We had the opportunity to stay at the Miller family's "Refuge," where we focused on team building and teamwork. Students were given three challenges throughout the retreat that emphasized communication, imagination, and comradery. On Friday evening, the students' skills were put to the test for our "Strike a Match" challenge where they were to build a fire and cook food that would be taste-tested by our sponsor judges. Students could only use cardboard, tarp, and duct tape to build a boat worthy to race in the regatta. After a while, their hard work and determination come to fruition! Humanities 11/12 Spotlight (Mrs. Monteen)

Recently, our six upper-level students took up the great dilemma of Mary Shelley's masterpiece, <u>Frankenstein</u>: Should Victor, at his created monster's demand, have produced a female companion? At the beginning of class, they were divided into two teams and given the task of arguing the affirmative or negative. Strong reasoning emerged on both sides of the debate. "Only God creates life. The monster is not human, but evil evidenced by his murderous rage. Victor Frankenstein should never create another being." "The monster has displayed both consciousness and moral understanding, two solely human characteristics. As God intended ALL creatures to live in relationships, to deny the monster a companion would go against the created order." Mr. Murray presided as judge and declared the negative position winners by the slimmest margin. This debate helped students relate to the characters of the novel, carefully consider universal questions of truth, and hone their rhetorical skills of persuasion. It was also a rousing good time.
